
Humpty Dumpty Lesson Plan

Advanced Objective:

Retell a familiar story, changing key details, characters, and sequence of events.

Use a combination of drawing and writing to tell a familiar story in a different way. Examples: Humpty Dumpty, Jack and the Beanstalk, Three Little Pigs



COS Objective:

With prompting and support, retell familiar stories, including key details. [RL.K.2]

Use a combination of drawing, dictating, and writing to narrate a single event or several loosely linked events, tell about the events in the order in which they occurred, and provide a reaction to what happened. [W.K.3]

Resources:

Poem - Humpty Dumpty

Materials:

Paper (folded in half, thirds, or quarters), crayons,

Activity:

- 1. Read and act out Humpty Dumpty
- 2. Ask, "What if Humpty Dumpty sat on a bridge, how would it change the story?" Turn and talk.
- 3. Brainstorm a list of other places Humpty might sit. Make a list on the board.
- 4. Divide children into tiered or interest groups. Students will illustrate their story on folded storyboards with two, three, or four sections.
- 5. After children complete their storyboards, they will share their illustration with their small group peers.
